





On October 3, 1944 the Pacific Command received a directive to seize positions in the Ryuku Islands. This was to be the culmination of three long years of fighting since Pearl Harbor.

The Battle of Okinawa would be the largest amphibious assault in history and the last battle of World War Two.

This eighty-two day battle would also be the bloodiest of the war.

Americans Killed in Action: 12,520 Wounded in Action 49,151

Japanese

Killed in Action: 110,071 Wounded in Action: 7,401

Civilian casualties: 142,058

I was wounded in action on May 22, 1945. I spent seventy-nine days in a Navy hospital on Guam before being transferred to Saipan, where I waited for my discharge.

I left Saipan on November 30, 1945.

Tuesday May 22, 1945
Wounded in action today. The damn lieutenant
told me and a buddy to head out before breakfast
on second patrol to locate a Jap with mortar.

I did locate it, right near my spine. Veteran Vern Nuns was hit in the leg. I was glad to get out of there. It happened near to Conical Hill and Dick Hill.

Two good buddies of mine were killed nearby. They were <u>Dussliere</u> and <u>Luebbe</u>.

Here is a copy of the morning report giving the official report of what happened.

Champagne, Roland JH Combat Infantry Pay Nuss, Vernon L.

Above named 2 EM (enlisted men) seriously wounded in action 600 yards NE of Shuri, Okinawa Island

Dy to SK Hospital unknown L.D. (living or dead)

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
Record of Events 600 yards NE of Shuri, Okinawa Island Patrol sent out 300 yards to front found no enemy but were fired on by enemy mortars. Wounded 2 EM (enlisted men) Though I do not remember it, I was probably sent to the back lines first by stretcher and then by a jeep ambulance.

On the next page is a map with an X on the spot where I was wounded.

You can see the advance of the different Armies further and further south.

The battled lasted 82 days. I was wounded on the 51st day. I was the last guy in my squad to be hit, after me they were all replacements.



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Here it is Memorial Day again. I wonder what the people back home are doing about it. I gave it great thought and prayed for my buddies and comrades who died in action.


I'm taking it easy here. I'm still in bed. My back hurts when I try to walk. I guess I'm still weak. You know I didn't register shock when I was hit. I didn't lose any blood to speak of. I was plenty scared and excited thats all.

The fragment went in the right side of the <u>midline</u> in my back. It stopped in front of my spinal chord just missing it. I saw x-rays of it. In preoperative the doctor stitched me up while under local anesthetic. It felt funny while he was working on me.


The doctor in the x-ray room is from Prospect Hill. He's a relative of Mrs. Kelly, 77 Butler. His name is Lieutenant Hirsch. I'll bet she'd be mighty glad to know he's alright and where he is.

Started my 24th month in the Army today. It was just a year ago that we moved to Camp Callan outside of San Diego. Funny how I can recall past events. I still remember all the dates when I was transferred to other camps.
The nurse in my ward is from Somerville. She's a cute little blonde - the excited type.
They gave me some clothes and the correct size too. They say I got hit right in the middle of my back. I was glad to get out of those dripping, sopping wet filthy clothes. Five minutes before my buddies and I were about sleeping in our foxholes that night.
We had about 5 inches of water in it with the blankets on the bottom you think, that beats an mattress keep our glasses filled with ice and water.
We have Coca Cola every afternoon. Fresh eggs and meats mostly every meal. And chocolate cake.
me writing about common foods back home! It's a treat out here times.


Didn't go to church today - I've been on my back ever since I've been wounded so last night I tried to get up and walk and I started wobbling and getting dizzy. My back feels tired when I sit up for awhile. I thought I was alright.

I guess I write everyday just to do something. Its now 4 P.M. and I'm hungry and waiting for chow. The chow is fair. I can't gripe, its better than eating a cold "meal" somewhere in combat. We had ice cream once so far. They have movies every night. Next Thursday they'll have "Here Come the Waves" with Bing Crosby. I sure miss seeing the good pictures coming out back home.

Now that summer is here, the kids ought to have plenty of writing material telling me all about their weekends. I wonder what little Roland will be doing on his weekends if he gets back in one piece. You'd know what I meant if you could see what war does to some of the Mama's little boys.

I guess constant prayers has spared me of such horror and misery. Thank God.



I'll be sending home another big check when I get it all together plus that 50 ____ to the bank.

Have you received any notice from the bank yet? Let me know when you do.


Have you ever seen or read of the 382nd Infantry in the ____ or Post? I've read about us in the Honolulu Star - Bulletin. Sheppard remember.

I'll be up and around in a few more days. The doc may leave the fragment in me. It'll feel kinda funny for awhile.


I hope you notice the address and also the heading. My mail still goes to the company. Don't forget.

Well I finally attended Mass today. The last time I went was on May 6th - the day I returned to K Co. Two days later we went out to fight on the front lines again.

16 days later I was wounded in action.

My wound was pretty itchy today. I guess its starting to heal up. I saw it last night with the aid of a mirror. It was worse than I expected and just think its 18 days after being wounded. Here's how it looked to me in the mirror.

You can see the diagram I drew on the letter. I was so lucky that the fragments did not hit my spine. I still have the fragment in my back as it was too dangerous to operate.




The Battle of Okinawa lasted 82 days. It was so bloody and devastating that it was a major reason that Truman decided to drop the atomic bomb.

Invading Japan would have been too costly in lives and wounded.

I was lucky to get out the way I did.
Though I was scared I could have been
easily paralyzed, as the shrapnel was less
than an inch from my spine.

It remains there to this day. It shows up as rectangular white space in x-rays of my abdomen. Doctors always ask what the heck it is. My son is proud to tell them.



This is a hurry up letter. I've been busy doing little details and too lazy.

I'm writing to let you know I'm still around. I was glad to hear the end of Okinawa.

That appointment of General "China" <u>Stilwell</u> as commander of 10th Army scares me. I wouldn't be surprised if he took us to China!

I'll end my letters with <u>au revoir</u> so you'll know whats going on. I hope you wont forget it. That way you wont have to worry when I don't write.


I may stay here two or three weeks. I guess!!!


Did you receive that WU telegram already. Haven't received the films yet.

I am not sure when I wrote these notes on this envelope. It had to have been sometime after my return home. It is the only record I have of my voyage home.

Left Saipan on November 30, 1945 on an old ship speeding along at 7 knots; strong sea only 5 K.

Sea sickness all the way from diesel exhaust, so thick it pours out of a glass - really!

Left California on Christmas day at 2:30 AM - yes.



This photo was taken January 18, 1946. I had been discharged from the Army on January 1, 1946. This is my first photo as a civilian again!

It was all quite an experience beginning just days after my high school graduation. I was one of the lucky ones to make it back, the true heroes never did. I always remember them.
