Howard Theodore Nye, 79, of Bozeman, passed away peacefully at his Bozeman home on Thursday evening, Oct. 7, 2004, surrounded by his family and the love of God.

Upon his discharge from the Army in January of 1946, Howard returned to the family ranch near Dixon. In 1951, with Jean and their children Linda and Paul, he moved to Kalispell where he owned and operated the Marshall Wells hardware store. In 1964, he purchased the Culligan dealership and moved to Bozeman.

In 1980, he married his beloved wife Betty. Together, they began a new adventure with Howard's two children and Betty's six children, Cheryl, Twila, Dale, Greg, Cathy and David. Jointly, Howard and Betty began and operated Nye's Clothesline on Main Street in Bozeman from 1985 to the present.

Howard is survived by his wife, Betty; his sons and their wives, Paul and Tammy Nye, Dale and Debbie Hadford, Greg and Virginia Hadford, and David and Annie Hadford; and his daughters and their husbands, Linda (Nye) and Mick O'Connor, Cheryl (Hadford) and Charlie Lytle, Cathy (Hadford) and Denny Dellwo, and Twila Vick and Wayne Vick; a sister, Ruth Stephens of Missoula. He was the proud grandfather of 23 grandchildren and 5 great-grandchildren.
